CALL TO ORDER: Meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by President Renaud.

President Renaud stated this meeting is being recorded, videotaped and broadcast. If any other person present was doing the same, they must notify the chairperson at this time. It was noted the City Council was audio recording and GCTV-15 was video recording the meeting for future broadcast.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE CITY OF GREENFIELD AS A SAFE CITY

PREAMBLE

THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE KNOWN AS THE CITY OF GREENFIELD SAFE CITY ORDINANCE. THE PURPOSE OF THE ORDINANCE IS TO AFFIRM THAT GREENFIELD IS A WELCOMING CITY, WHICH EMBRACES EVERYONE INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO THE IMMIGRANT, THE REFUGEE, THE ASYLUM SEEKER AND ANYONE OF GOOD FAITH AND GOOD WILL WHO WISHES TO BE A MEMBER OF OUR COMMUNITY. THE PURPOSE OF THIS ORDINANCE IS TO PROMOTE A SENSE OF OPENNESS AND TRUST BETWEEN ALL MEMBERS OF OUR COMMUNITY AND TO LET ALL PEOPLE KNOW THAT THEY ARE WELCOME HERE.

DEFINITIONS

(a) "CITY OFFICIAL" MEANS ANY CITY OF GREENFIELD DEPARTMENT AND ITS EMPLOYEES AND ANY OFFICER OR EMPLOYEE OF THE CITY AUTHORIZED, OR WITH THE POWER, TO ENFORCE REGULATIONS, CODES, LOCAL ORDINANCES, OR CRIMINAL STATUTES; OR AUTHORIZED TO DETAIN OR MAINTAIN CUSTODY OF INDIVIDUALS.

(b) "CIVIL IMMIGRATION DETAINER REQUEST" MEANS A NON-MANDATORY, WRITTEN OR VERBAL, REQUEST ISSUED BY IMMIGRATION AND CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT ("ICE") OR BY ANY OTHER FEDERAL IMMIGRATION OFFICER OR AGENCY TO A LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIAL, EITHER (1) TO MAINTAIN CUSTODY OF AN INDIVIDUAL ONCE THAT PERSON IS ELIGIBLE FOR RELEASE FROM LOCAL CUSTODY, OR (2) TO NOTIFY THE REQUESTING FEDERAL IMMIGRATION OFFICE OR OFFICIAL PRIOR TO THE RELEASE OF THAT INDIVIDUAL.

(c) "ELIGIBLE FOR RELEASE FROM CUSTODY" MEANS THAT THERE IS NO JUDICIAL WARRANT, JUDICIAL ORDER OR LAW THAT PREVENTS AN INDIVIDUAL FROM BEING RELEASED FROM THE CUSTODY OF A GREENFIELD OFFICIAL.

(d) "ICE ADMINISTRATIVE WARRANT" MEANS A WARRANT, NOTICE TO APPEAR, REMOVAL ORDER, OR WARRANT OF DEPORTATION ISSUED BY A FEDERAL IMMIGRATION OFFICER, NOT A JUDICIAL OFFICER, THAT DOES NOT CONFER DETENTION AUTHORITY ON A LOCAL JURISDICTION.

MAINTAINING A SAFE CITY

(a) A CITY OFFICIAL SHALL NOT INQUIRE AS TO AN INDIVIDUAL'S IMMIGRATION STATUS UNLESS REQUIRED BY FEDERAL OR STATE LAW.

(b) A CITY OFFICIAL SHALL NOT TARGET WITH LEGAL ACTION OR DISCRIMINATE AGAINST A MEDICAL, EDUCATIONAL, OR FAITH INSTITUTION IN THEIR MISSION OF PROVIDING REFUGE TO IMMIGRANTS AND THEIR FAMILIES.

(c) A CITY OFFICIAL SHALL NOT INITIATE AN INVESTIGATION OR TAKE LAW ENFORCEMENT ACTION, INCLUDING REGULATORY ACTION, ON THE BASIS OF ACTUAL OR PERCEIVED IMMIGRATION STATUS.

(d) NOTWITHSTANDING SECTIONS 2(A) AND 2(C) ABOVE, A PERSON'S IMMIGRATION STATUS SHALL NOT PROHIBIT OR INHIBIT THE CITY OR ANY CITY OFFICIAL'S PARTICIPATION IN ANY GOVERNMENT OPERATION OR PROGRAM THAT CONFERS AN IMMIGRATION BENEFIT, OR TEMPORARILY OR PERMANENTLY PROTECTS NONCITIZENS FROM REMOVAL AS PROVIDED THROUGH PROGRAMS SUCH AS THE U VISA, THE T VISA, AND THE FEDERAL VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN ACT.

(e) WHEN AN INDIVIDUAL IS ELIGIBLE FOR RELEASE FROM CUSTODY, A CITY OFFICIAL SHALL NOT DETAIN NOR DELAY THE RELEASE OF AN INDIVIDUAL ON THE

BASIS OF A CIVIL IMMIGRATION DETAINER REQUEST OR AN ICE ADMINISTRATIVE WARRANT FOR THE INDIVIDUAL.

(f) A CITY OFFICIAL SHALL HONOR JUDICIAL WARRANTS, BUT SHALL NOT RESPOND TO AN ICE REQUEST FOR NOTIFICATION ABOUT THE INCARCERATION STATUS OR PENDING RELEASE OF A PERSON IN CUSTODY AND SHALL NOT OTHERWISE COMMUNICATE WITH ICE ABOUT A PERSON WHO IS IN ITS CUSTODY, INCLUDING PROVIDING INFORMATION ABOUT THE PERSON'S RELEASE FROM CUSTODY, HOME ADDRESS, WORK ADDRESS, OR PHONE NUMBER.

(g) TO THE EXTENT PERMISSIBLE BY LAW, A CITY OFFICIAL SHALL NOT PERFORM THE FUNCTIONS OF AN IMMIGRATION OFFICER, WHETHER PURSUANT TO 8 U.S.C. SECTION 1357(G) OR ANY OTHER LAW, REGULATION, OR POLICY, WHETHER FORMAL OR INFORMAL.

COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL LAW

NOTHING IN THIS ORDINANCE SHALL PROHIBIT OR RESTRAIN ANY CITY OFFICIAL SENDING TO, OR RECEIVING FROM, ANY LOCAL, STATE, OR FEDERAL AGENCY, INFORMATION REGARDING CITIZENSHIP OR IMMIGRATION STATUS, CONSISTENT WITH 8 U.S.C. SECTION 1373.

EFFECTIVE DATE

THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY UPON PASSAGE.

IMPLEMENTATION

ALL POLICIES, PRACTICES, PROCEDURES, AND TRAINING NECESSARY TO EFFECTIVELY IMPLEMENT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IMPLEMENTED BY THE CITY AND ITS DEPARTMENTS.

SEVERABILITY

IF ANY PART OF THIS ORDINANCE IS DECLARED INVALID FOR ANY REASON, THE REMAINDER OF THE ORDINANCE SHALL REMAIN IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT.

DISCUSSION: Chairperson Gilmour reported the A&O forwarded a vote of 3 yes, 1 no and 1 abstention to recommend. President Renaud announced that she would invoke rule 5 of the Rules of Procedure to give 5 minutes to each Councilor to speak and no Councilor can speak more than twice on the same motion. Other discussion included:

- There were two recommendations to amend the ordinance made at the A & O Committee meeting.

MOTION: On a motion by Councilor Mass, second by Councilor Pyfrom, it was,

MOVED: TO AMEND THE LANGUAGE IN THE SECTION TITLED: **MAINTAINING A SAFE CITY** (B) BY REPLACING “OR DISCRIMINATE” FOR “IN A DISCRIMINATORY MANNER”.

DISCUSSION: Councilor Mass provided his rationale for the amendment.

It was, by majority,

DEFEATED: TO APPROVE AMENDMENT.

MOTION: On a motion by Councilor Mass, second by Councilor Gilmour, it was, by majority, 4 yes, 5 no,
DEFEATED: TO AMEND LANGUAGE IN THE SECTION TITLED: **MAINTAINING A SAFE CITY (C)**, BY ADDING AT THE END OF THE PARAGRAPH, “EXCEPT AS REQUIRED BY STATE AND FEDERAL LAW.”

Chief Haigh was asked the following questions by Councilors:

- Had any City Officials ever approached the Police to inquire about someone’s immigration status, target or discriminate or initiate any investigations against someone due to their immigration status.

DISCUSSION:

- The Ordinance would not prevent Federal Officials from enforcing the law.
- Most of the Councilors were supportive of this ordinance.
- The Ordinance would prevent City Officials from performing regulatory actions in accordance with State and Federal law.
- The Ordinance would help to deal with the issue of race relations at a City level.
- President Renaud presented her rationale for the submission of this ordinance.

MOTION: On a motion by Councilor Dolan, second by Councilor Pyfrom, it was unanimously,
VOTED: TO CALL THE QUESTION.

It was by roll call, 10 yes, 3 no,

VOTED: TO APPROVE ORDER NO. FY 20-016.

President Renaud calls recess at 9:25 pm

President Renaud resumed meeting at 9:30 pm.

MOTION: On a motion by Councilor Mass, second by Councilor Allis it was by majority, 2 no,
VOTED: THAT IT BE ORDERED, THAT THE GREENFIELD CITY COUNCIL WAIVE THE RULES OF PROCEDURE, 8 ORDER AND DISPOSITION OF BUSINESS.

MOTION: On a motion by Councilor Wheeler, second by Councilor Ricketts, it was by roll call, 2 yes, 9 no, 1 abstention,

DEFEATED: THAT IT BE ORDERED THAT THE GREENFIELD CITY COUNCIL TAKE FROM THE TABLE ORDER NO. FY 19-121 “THE SUM OF \$120,000 BE APPROPRIATED FOR THE REPAIR DESIGN FOR THE WILEY RUSSELL DAM. Order no. FY 20-012

MOTION: On a motion by Councilor Gilmour, second by Councilor Mayo, it was,

MOVED: THAT IT BE ORDERED THAT THE GREENFIELD CITY COUNCIL AMENDS THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GREENFIELD BY ADDING CHAPTER 302 MINIMUM WAGES FOR EMPLOYEES PERFORMING WORK IN THE CITY OF GREENFIELD MASSACHUSETTS

ORDINANCE, WHICH SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE ON JANUARY 1, 2020, AS ATTACHED HERETO AND FURTHER AMENDS THE TABLE OF CONTENTS AND INDEX OF CONTENTS OF THE CODE AND FURTHER THAT NONSUBSTANTIVE CHANGES TO THE NUMBERING OF THE ORDINANCE BE PERMITTED IN ORDER THAT IT BE IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE NUMBERING FORMAT OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GREENFIELD.

MINIMUM WAGES FOR EMPLOYEES PERFORMING WORK IN THE CITY OF GREENFIELD, MASSACHUSETTS

IT IS HEREBY DECLARED TO BE AGAINST THE PUBLIC POLICY FOR ANY EMPLOYER TO EMPLOY ANY PERSON IN AN OCCUPATION BY THE CITY OF GREENFIELD, MASSACHUSETTS AS AN OPPRESSIVE AND UNREASONABLE WAGE IN ANY CONTRACT, AGREEMENT, OR UNDERSTANDING IN RELATION TO SUCH EMPLOYMENT FOR A WAGE LESS THAN FIFTEEN DOLLARS (\$15.00) PER HOUR AND SUCH LESSER WAGE SHALL CONCLUSIVELY BE PRESUMED TO BE OPPRESSIVE AND UNREASONABLE, WHENEVER THE TERM “MINIMUM WAGE” IS USED HEREIN.

ANY EMPLOYEE EMPLOYED BY THE CITY OF GREENFIELD, AS DEFINED HEREIN, SHALL BE COMPENSATED AT AN HOURLY RATE OF NOT LESS THAN \$15.00 AN HOUR.

DEFINITIONS: THE FOLLOWING TERMS SHALL MEAN:

“CITY” MEANS THE CITY OF GREENFIELD, MASSACHUSETTS

“EMPLOY” MEANS TO SUFFER OR PERMIT TO WORK

“EMPLOYEE” MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO FULL-TIME EMPLOYER, TEMPORARY WORKER WHO IS EMPLOYED BY THE CITY.

“MINIMUM WAGE” MEANS ALL WAGES, COMMISSIONS, PIECE RATE, AND BONUSES ACTUALLY RECEIVED BY THE EMPLOYEE AND AS REPORTABLE TO THE UNITED STATES INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE

“WAGE” MEANS COMPENSATION DUE TO THE EMPLOYEE BY REASON OF EMPLOYMENT, PAYABLE IN LEGAL TENDER OF THE UNITED STATES OR CHECKS AND BANK CONVERTIBLE INTO CASH ON DEMAND AT FULL FACE VALUE. EMPLOYER PAYMENTS TOWARD A MEDICAL BENEFIT PLAN AND/OR ACCOUNTS DO NOT CONSTITUTE WAGES FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS ORDINANCE,

“EXCEPTION” MEANS ANY MINOR UNDER THE AGE OF 18, LAWFULLY EMPLOY BY THE CITY OF GREENFIELD AND/OR ANY OF ITS SUBDIVISIONS MAY BE COMPENSATED AT A WAGE LESS THAN \$15.00 PER HOUR, BUT IN NO EVENT FOR A LESSER WAGE PROVIDED AS A MATTER OF LAW BY THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS AS PARTICULARLY CONTAINED IN M.G.L. C. 151: MINIMUM FAIR WAGES.

“HEALTH BENEFITS” MEANS THAT IN NO EVENT SHALL THE PAYMENT BY THE EMPLOYER OF HEALTH BENEFITS FOR EMPLOYEES AFFECT THE HOURLY SAID PAID AS PRESCRIBED HERE.

NOTHING HEREIN SHALL APPLY TO WAGES CONTRACTED, PRIOR TO THE EFFECTED DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE, BY COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT DURING THE TERM OF THE AGREEMENT. IT SHALL APPLY TO ALL AGREEMENTS THEREAFTER OR ANY AMENDMENT TO AN EXISTING AGREEMENT.

THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE ON JANUARY 1, 2020.

IF ANY TERM, CONDITION OR PART OF THIS ORDINANCE IS DEEMED INVALID, VOID OR VOIDABLE IT SHALL NOT INVALIDATE THE REMAINDER OF THE ORDINANCE.

ANY VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE ENFORCED BY ANY AGENCY OR COURT HAVING APPLICABLE JURISDICTION.

DISCUSSION: Chairperson Gilmour reported A&O forwarded a positive recommendation; however, Councilor Mass was not present for the vote and requested further discussion. Other discussion included:
